PRINCIPAL REPORT

<u>Transition to Secondary School</u>

The dates and process for the transition of students from primary to secondary school have been set up by the Department of Education (DE) and all year six students' families will have received the information via Compass.

All year 6 students will have received via email:

Year 6 - 7 Transition Information Pack, and

A Year 6 - 7 placement application form.

This documentation will explain the process and timeline for applying for secondary schools.

The placement application form will need to be returned to Moonee Ponds Primary School (moonee.ponds.ps@education.vic.gov.au) no later than Friday 10 May.

Mother's Day Stall

Attitudes to School Survey (Year 4/5/6)

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of our school. The Attitudes to School survey is an annual survey for Years 4 to 12 students offered by the Department of Education and Training. It is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Students will be asked about their thoughts and feelings in relation to their school, their learning, peer relationships, bullying and life in general. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's experience at school.

Students in Year 4, 5 and 6 will participate in this year's survey. All responses to the survey are anonymous. This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted at our school over the period Monday 6 May 2024 to Friday 14 June 2024. The survey only takes 20-30 minutes to complete and occurs during your child's class time. Parents and Carers of students in Year 4-6 have received further information about the Attitudes to School Survey via Compass.

Moonee Valley Racecourse Development - Infield Survey

Many families will be across the development of the MVRC Development. Part of their plan is to activate the infield area of the track for community use. MPPS students in the past have utilised the track and infield area for school cross country and other sports. We invite families to complete the survey to assist in advocating for community (and school) use. This includes accessing the sporting fields (netball, soccer, football) and toilet facilities for student use in the future.

Are your Student and Family Details correct?

Just a reminder to families to please ensure that your contact and family details including emergency contacts are valid and correct. If your circumstances have changed please let the office know ASAP as we often find out that numbers or addresses have changed or that emergency contacts are not even available to assist in an emergency. If you are unsure, please contact the office to check.

School Saving Bonus

You may have seen the recent announcement of the School Saving Bonus, as part of the Victorian Budget 2024/25. We are sharing more information about how families will be able to access and use this support. This one-off support will include \$400 for each eligible student to help families cover the costs of school uniforms and activities in 2025.

PRINCIPAL REPORT - CONT.

It will be available to parents and carers of every child enrolled in a Victorian government school in 2025. Cash will not be paid directly to individuals or families. Instead, families will receive the bonus as credits on their school accounts that will help meet the costs of your children's activities and uniforms.

Existing supports

The School Saving Bonus support will be in addition to existing and continuing means-tested supports for camps, sports, excursions and uniforms.

The application-based <u>Affordable School Uniform program</u>, through State Schools' Relief, will continue to be available to families experiencing financial hardship or other forms of vulnerability and short-term crisis. This program allows schools to make multiple applications for support on parents' behalf throughout the year if needed.

There will be more information and guidance about the School Saving Bonus in Term 3, 2024, ahead of its implementation in 2025.

Mum's the work

Watching my own children become parents is an unexpected parenting joy.

Not in the light-hearted 'your-turn-has-come' way where older generations delight in watching their own children endure the same sleepless nights, naughty toddler behaviour and teenage rebelliousness that they experienced as parents.

The joy for me lies in watching my adult kids protect, teach, nurture and support their children, in the time-honored way that parents have done for generations. This work, also known as generative parenting, was outlined by American psychologists and researchers Dollahite, Hawkins and Brotherson in the 1990's.

Also known as mother work (and father work), generative parenting refers to the instinctive activities of parents that enable the next generation to survive and thrive. These activities range from providing kids with food and shelter and other basic needs through to developing more complex skills in their kids such as working with others, adapting to change and developing the resourcefulness needed for full independence.

Like most parents my daughters want to be the best parents they can be so they both devour parenting books, attend courses when they can and join online chat groups for support and ideas.

But it's their mother work, their instinctive work, that's their most potent parenting force. Here's why.

Mother work is protective

When my eldest daughter visits our house she does a quick reconnaissance trip through each room, lifting errant blind cords and removing heavy objects, to make our house safe for her two boys to move around. The protective side is strong.

Mother work is educative

When my youngest daughter patiently explains to her exuberant young three year old that she needs to allow other children to share her toys, she is doing important teaching work. That requires super patience.

Mother work is nurturant

The safety my daughters provide when they wrap their arms around their children when they've fallen and hurt themselves comes naturally to them.

Mother work is supportive

The emotional support these young women provide to their children when they've been upset by the thoughtless or rough behaviours of siblings and friends is often hard work. But they are up to the task.

My daughters' mother work will continue well into their children's teen years and beyond. The nature of the work will change with each developmental stage but the intent of the work –to nurture, protect, teach and support – will stay the same.

Men can do this work too, but they do it differently. When a mother instinctively protects she generally draws her child closer before searching out the source of fear. There'll be lots of cuddles before she puts a nightlight on to ease a child's fear of the dark.

When a father instinctively protects he's more likely to eliminate the source of fear, and skill his child up to fend for themselves. He'll prove there's nothing to be scared of when the light goes out, and show his child how to turn on the light when needed. Both are valid approaches, and are indicative of the gender differences in child-rearing.

This Mother's Day, it's my daughters' instinctive mother work that I'll celebrate, as that is real magic of parenting. Happy Mother's Day.

The 2024 Australian Early Development Census

Every school counts

The Australian Early Development Census (AEDC) is a national census that builds a picture of how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school.

Every school has a vital role to play in helping our nation collect the information it needs to better understand and respond to the needs of children and their families.

Since 2009, communities, schools and governments across Australia have used AEDC results to help provide services, resources and supports that give our kids the best start in life.

From May 2024, teachers will complete the census for children in their first year of full-time school. AEDC results for individual children are not reported and individual children cannot be identified.

With the support of parents/carers and schools, we can build a more complete picture of early childhood development in Australia. If parents/carers consent to the collection of their child's information they do not need to do anything. Parents/carers only need to contact the school if they do not consent to the collection of their child's information.
